OBJECTIVE	Research the Irish records and connect with other researchers in Rathcormack area confirming Mara information.
BACKGROUND SUMMARY	John Mara was one of the Peter Robinson settlers in 1823 from Rathcormack, Cork, Ireland to Lanark County, Ontario, Canada. Information used in conjunction with Ancestry.ca tree "[PRIVATE]" by [LIVING], and personal genealogy notes provided by [LIVING]. His David Mara appears on Rathcormack records after the remaining family had left for Canada in 1823. There is also evidence pointing to John Mara having an earlier marriage and first wife, with children, before marrying Johanna Foley at age 26-36 (older for the time period – men did not usually wait past 20).

Mara is used here, except in citations, where names appear as they do in the sources.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS:

The research objective for this session has been met.

In my follow-up research to finding Thomas' baptismal record (research from February 2024), I documented each Mara (and name variant) occurrence in the Rathcormack Parish records. The occurrences of John Mara Sr. having a plausible first marriage, as well as son David Mara and records indicating his marriage in Rathcormack, further research was required.

I suspect John Mara was previously married considering he married Johanna Foley at age 26-36, which is beyond the typical age for men of that time period of age 20. I found evidence which suggests he married Margaret Egan before 1790 in Rathcormack and had four *probable* children with her from 1790-1795 estimated (only one is confirmed parentage – Mary in 1794). She would have died between 1795-1807, with 1808 being the date David is born (with wife Johanna Foley), hence he would have remarried in 1807 or before.

David Mara (b. 1808 son of John and Johanna) stayed in Ireland at age 15 (in 1823) and did not immigrate with the family. It is *possible* he stayed to work with his uncle James. David married Mary Honora Gleeson before 1829 and had two daughters with her, both baptised at Rathcormack. He gives his address as Garryantaggart. I found him living in Kilcor North (due east of Rathcormack and due north of Garryantaggart and Ballyogaha – within a 7 kms radius) in the 1840s and 1850s. There is no further information beyond this.

While researching David Mara/Meara, I discovered another David Mara living south about 20 kms in the village of Killacloyne, part of Carrigtohill. I do not know if there is a relation here, but I've included it for reference.

Consultations with other Irish researchers (in County Cork, Ireland)

I reached out to Ireland and connected with fellow genealogist, Niall O'Mahony, who heads the Genealogy for Fermoy and Rathcormack area. John Arnold, researcher, also offered to help, but with no luck. Learning more about the penal laws, I understand the challenges the Mara family had – keeping Catholic records were forbidden during that time period.

My consultations with other Irish researchers in the Rathcormack and Fermoy area confirmed while some baptism records exist for Rathcormack parish in late 1700s, marriage records only exist from 1829 to approx. 1880s. Most of the Penal Laws were repealed in 1793, however Catholic emancipation did not happen until 1829. Therefore research prior to these dates is difficult for any Catholic ancestors.

As it is suspected John Mara married prior to 1793, records will be quite difficult to find and confirm. The following information on Penal Laws paints a picture of how difficult life for John Mara, a Catholic, and his family would have had living in Cork during this time. He was quite poor (a pauper when Peter Robinson took him in 1823) and with no means to support himself and family.

Penal Laws

"In 1695 harsh penal laws were enforced, known as the 'popery code': Catholics were prohibited from buying land, bringing their children up as Catholics, and from entering the forces or the law. Catholics could no longer run for elected office, purchase land, or own property (such as horses) valued at more than 5 pounds. In the early years of the 18th century the ruling Protestants in Ireland passed these laws designed to strip the "backwards" Catholic population of remaining land, positions of influence and civil rights.

By 1778 Irish Catholics would own a meager 5% of Irish land. Furthermore, the Catholic educational system was outlawed and priests who did not conform to the laws could be branded on the face or castrated. As a result, much of Catholic church services and education and record keeping was forced underground, to operate only under extreme secrecy. The religion and culture were kept alive by secret open-air masses and illegal outdoor schools, known as 'hedge' schools. All Irish culture, music and education was banned. By the time of the census of 1841 the Irish were impoverished, landless and leaderless by the eve of the famine.

Professor Lecky a British Protestant and ardent British sympathizer, said in his "History of Ireland in the 18th Century" that the object of the Penal Laws was threefold:

"To deprive Catholics of all civil life; to reduce them to a condition of extreme, brutal ignorance; and, to disassociate them from the soil.:

Lecky said, "He might with absolute justice, substitute Irish for Catholic, "and added a fourth objective: "To expatriate the race." Most scholars agree that the Penal Laws helped set the stage for the injustices that occurred during The Great Famine and fueled the fires of racism that were directed against the Irish by the British. Lecky outlined the Penal Laws as follows:¹

- The Catholic Church forbidden to keep church registers.
- The Irish Catholic was forbidden the exercise of his religion.
- *He was forbidden to receive education.*
- *He was forbidden to enter a profession.*
- *He was forbidden to hold public office.*
- *He was forbidden to engage in trade or commerce.*
- *He was forbidden to live in a corporate town or within five miles thereof.*
- *He was forbidden to own a horse of greater value than five pounds.*
- *He was forbidden to own land.*
- *He was forbidden to lease land.*
- He was forbidden to accept a mortgage on land in security for a loan.
- *He was forbidden to vote.*
- *He was forbidden to keep any arms for his protection.*
- *He was forbidden to hold a life annuity.*

- *He was forbidden to buy land from a Protestant.*
- *He was forbidden to receive a gift of land from a Protestant.*
- *He was forbidden to inherit land from a Protestant.*
- *He was forbidden to inherit anything from a Protestant.*
- He was forbidden to rent any land that was worth more than 30 shillings a year.
- *He was forbidden to reap from his land any profit exceeding a third of the rent.*
- He could not be guardian to a child.
- *He could not, when dying, leave his infant children under Catholic guardianship.*
- *He could not attend Catholic worship.*
- *He was compelled by law to attend Protestant worship.*
- *He could not himself educate his child.*
- *He could not send his child to a Catholic teacher.*
- He could not employ a Catholic teacher to come to his child.
- *He could not send his child abroad to receive education.*

Housing and Landlords

Life would have been hard for the family under the laws of the time against Catholic Irish. Any house would most likely be of branches and earth sod with some stone if available and allowed by landlord.

Military

If John Mara had joined the military he would have been in the South Cork Light Infantry Militia stationed in Rathcormack. However, it appears there wouldn't have been a great need for militia in the area, so it is uncertain if he was a part of this. No found documents have pointed to him having a military career, so I question the delay in his marriage to Johanna if it weren't for that he were already married. Additionally, reading about the harsh Penal Laws, a Catholic was not allowed to enter the forces – John Mara would not have been allowed to join, if he admitted his faith.

Later they became the 3rd Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers.

From the period of 1793-1815, "the regiment was embodied (except for a short time in 1800 and again in 1814) and was deployed to various parts of Ireland (except for 1813-1814 in England). The only significant event inside County Cork was in 1796 when the French attempted an invasion of Bantry Bay."

The militia disembodied on 16 Mar 1815.

Trade

Rathcormack at that time was a more productive village compared to Fermoy which had only a Coachmans Inn until the Army were given land by John Anderson to build two barracks in the early 1800s. Fermoy grew from there and businesses of all types developed. Rathcormack has not changed much since that time going by the old maps.

Figure below: Taylor and Skinner's maps of 1777. Rathcormac spelled Rathcormuck. Kilworth as shown on map was the other main place of trade at the time.



As the family is shown to live in Bartelmy, in the towns of Garryantaggart and Ballyogaha, they likely would have traveled to Kilworth, Fermoy, and Rathcormack.


Mass Rock

So while records may not be available for John Mara/O'Mara and Johanna Foley, I hope this gives a picture of what life was like for the family and their ancestors in the 1700s early 1800s. The local landlord/Baron, army barracks of Rathcormac and living conditions of the houses the family would have lived in.

Niall also provided a few photos from Google Maps for an area known as "Mass Rock" / Famine Walk near Rathcormack in Knocknacaheragh, County Cork, which still today has visitors. He added Mass had to be done in secret as banned by laws. This Mass Rock is due West of the areas the Mara family lived. The stone plaque inside Mass Rock is decorated with painted crosses on the stones, and a plaque which "IN PENAL DAYS, MASS WAS OFFERED HERE, 1691-1829." John Mara

and family could have come here for mass, as it is one of the only Mass Rocks in the entire area. It sits about 15 kms from Rathcormack.

Today, it is encouraged for visitors to come to Mass Rock to embrace what it would have been like for ancestors to have to worship their Catholic faith in secret. As John Mara would have been one of those affected Catholics, I encourage you to visit this holy place when making your visit to Ireland. When visiting Mass Rock, opposite side of the road is the Famine Walk, a 2k walk along the River Coom, which is a pilgrimage walk for those affected by the Great Hunger – An Gorta Mor (with the greatest years 1846-1850).






Figure 4: A sign within the Mass Rock and Famine Walk area (photo from Google images)

Discrepancies in John Mara's age and birth year: Letters from Peter Robinson²

LETTER FROM PETER ROBINSON:

"In choosing the emigrants, the instructions that they should be farmers, able to make good settlers and without the means of supporting themselves in Ireland was strictly adhered to. In one particular - I was induced to deviate in a few instances which was in admitting a small number above the age of forty-five - they are however farmers of superior intelligence and character to the other emigrants and appear from their experience in agriculture and their greater practical knowledge capable of giving a good example to the other settlers."

The above-mentioned detail of only a few instances "admitting a small number above the age of forty-five – they are however farmers of superior intelligence and character...". We see John Mara is listed as age 42 on the ships lists, but given age 52 in Donald McKay's book.

It is likely John didn't know his correct age, and so said something closer to his wife Johanna's age, so he would be "younger" and not miss the opportunity to be a part of the emigration of settlers to Canada. He might not have known his exact age, as many 18th century Irish didn't keep track of such things. Most Irish relied on their baptismal record or notes in the family Bible as their proof of birth, however John might not have had any of this information when he emigrated. Official documents weren't required when emigrating and after landing in the new country, records were created by going on "their word". Many birth and marriage records remained only back home in Ireland in the Parish books (if they were allowed – and after the Penal Laws were abolished) and weren't able to be quickly copied or taken with them as we do today – it wasn't done yet at that time.

I hypothesize he was born closer to 1771-1775, and was previously married, hence why he married Johanna Foley at an older age than a Bachelor would at age 18-20. He was aged 26-36 when he married.

We can use John's brother, James to help date his age. James' first known child is born in 1801, so he would have married about 1800 or before and be at least 18-20 years younger, putting his birth years about 1780-1782, but possibly before those dates also.

When he emigrates in July 1823, he is listed as age 42 on the Stakesby passenger list

In Donald McKay's book, he is listed as **age 52** in **1823**.

His letter home to his brother James dated November 20, 1823 he is listed as age 52.

In the land deed dated **October 11, 1824**, he is again shown as **age 42** – though this is more than a year after he has emigrated to Upper Canada (image and transcription in original Mara report).

Probable first marriage for John Mara (b. 1771-1781) with Margaret Egan:

In my first report for John Mara (b. 1771-1781) I suspected he was previously married, as he was between ages 26-36 when he married Johanna Foley – well beyond the typical age of 18-21, indicating military or a previous marriage. We now know Penal Laws would have prevented him from joining the military. A previous marriage does look more plausible.

Margaret Egan would have had to have passed away between the birth of Honora in est. 1795 and before the birth of son David in 1808, with Johanna Foley, second wife.

More on the age hypothesis: The only confirmed child born of the marriage of John Mara and Margaret Egan is daughter Mary in 1794, with evidence from her baptismal record naming parentage. This puts his first marriage at abt 1793 or before *probable* in Rathcormack area. John would have to be between the ages of 18-20 on average to marry in 1793, which puts his earliest acceptable birthdate at abt 1773-1775 – which is more in line with the date of 1771 (given by his age 52 in Donald McKay's book). Otherwise, he would have only been age 12 in 1793 and too young to marry (if he were born in 1781). It is unlikely it is a different John Mara living in the same area.

With Margaret Egan, I believe his children are (including possible):

Margaret Mara b. est 1790 Ellen Mara b. est. 1792 Mary Mara b. 1794 (baptismal record confirmed parentage) Honora Mara b. est 1795

I could not find the marriage record for John Mara and Margaret Egan, though a small search was performed, as they would have had to have been married before 1790 (see notes on Penal Laws forbidding Catholic records prior to this date).

1814-1815 est. marriage of Mary Mara & Patrick Mahon

Mary Mara could be a potential daughter for John Mara Sr.. She is married to Patrick Mahon. Based on her first child's birthdate, we can guess she was born abt. 1794-1795, making this a match.

Mary Mahon, bap 1 Apr 1816 in Rathcormack Margaret Mahon, bap 9 Dec 1821 in Rathcormack Patrick Mahon, bap 9 Mar 1823 in Rathcormack Daniel Mahon, bap 26 Feb 1826 Rathcormack

The other children who follow do not have baptismal records, as Penal Laws applied to this time period and records were not allowed to be kept (ban lifted in 1792). Confirmation of their parentage cannot be proven at this time, but I suspect the following three children are *probable* children of John Mara & Margaret Egan. I have estimated their baptismal dates based on their marriage dates at Rathcormack Parish to their respective partners.

Margaret Mara

1789 est. baptism of Margaret Mara daughter of John Mara & Margaret Egan

Margaret Mara could be a potential daughter for John Mara Sr.. She is married to Richard Shea. Based on her first child's birthdate, we can guess she was born abt. 1789-90.

1809-1810 est. marriage of Margaret Mara & Richard Shea

They are the parents of: Margaret Shea, bap 3 Oct 1810 in Rathcormack Patrick Shea, bap 13 Apr 1814 in Rathcormack Mary Shea, bap 15 Feb 1816 in Rathcormack Thomas Shea, bap 25 Nov 1818 in Rathcormack David Shea, bap 14 Mar 1820 in Rathcormack Elizabeth Shea, bap 27 Apr 1823 in Rathcormack, Address of Lusheborker Richard Shea, bap 12 Jan 1826 in Rathcormack

Ellen Mara

1791 est. baptism of Ellen Mara daughter of John Mara & Margaret Egan

Ellena (Ellen) Mara could be a potential daughter for John Mara Sr.. She is married to John Garvan. Based on her first child's birthdate, we can guess she was born abt. 1798 (possibly abt. 1791 if based on her as a godparent/witness to others baptisms).

They are the parents of: Mary Garvan, bap 30 Jun 1818 in Rathcormack Bridget Garvan, bap 24 Sep 1820 in Rathcormack

As referenced before, John Mara Sr. and his brother James Mara both had sons named David Mara (born 1808 and 1811 respectively). The following records could pertain to either David. David would have married between 1828-1830 to Mary Honora Gleeson.

1828-1830 marriage of David Mara & Mary Honora Gleeson

This record has not been found. It would not list parentage, but only a location of the marriage and witnesses. We can estimate the marriage date based on his birth date and the baptismal dates of his children, which follow.

There is a possibility that David Mara remarried to a Honora "Norry" Shanahan and moved to Carrigtohill. One of his daughters marries in Carrigtohill. I address the other "David Mara" later in this report.

Children of David Mara & Mary Honora Gleeson:

A birth of 1830 she would be eligible for marriage at age 18-20, estimated 1848-1850. The following record is the nearest marriage date in the surrounding locations to Rathcormack within 20kms. Interesting to note the town of Carrigtohill for their marriage, as later in this report I show a David Mara marrying in Carrigtohill – which I suspect might be a second marriage for David.

David Mara House Books (early census/land records):

David Mara – at Kilcor North, Castlelyons:

I hypothesized that the 1847 & 1848 house books belonged to the same person, and it is still plausible that it could be. The one in 1847 belongs to a David Mara in Killacloyne near Carrigtohill. It also shows the name David crossed off and the wife Norra/Norry (short for Honora) has been placed.

It is highly *probable* David was in Kilcor at this time, near other family members closer to Garryantaggart – where his children were born. The proximity of of Garryantaggart and Kilcor North is only 6 kilometres. As travel would have taken some effort for this family to do so in the early 1840s (the height of the Irish Potato Famine), I believe the closeness in proximity of Kilcor North points to the correct David Mara.

I address the David Mara in Killacloyne, Carrigtohill later in this report.

The House books in Kilcor North were assessed in 1848, with the town initially reviewed in Summer 1848 and later revised in Spring 1849. These records were also used as a basis for all future updates and revaluation, and in some cases up to the 1970s.³

Thus, David Mara's house – the number '3' indicates a **thatch roof house**, where the building had stone walls with mud mortar or mud walls of the best kind.⁵ The quality letter 'C' indicates it was more than 25 years old, but in repair⁶ (with 'A' being a new house, 'B' being of medium age, and 'C' being old).⁷ It's measurements were 21'6'' x 18' x 6'.

The quality letters attributed to each building were based upon the valuation data. The appearance and condition of the house is deduced from this and from the measurements. Buildings were measured on the outside, with length, breadth, and height recorded in feet and inches. A measure was 10 square feet and the figure in the number the of measures is the previous figures multiplied together then divided by 10. The rate per measure was determined by the quality letter.⁸




Figure 16: A close-up of the Field Book headers listing Number of House, Subdenominations and Observations, Quantity (Acres, Roods, Perches), Rate per Statute Acre, Amount of Land (Pounds, Shillings, Pence), and Amount of Houses, one-third being deducted






Figure 18: Map of Kilcor North (blue outline) and showing Rathcormack on far left side 9

These maps give a general area of Kilcor North and what was within that town at the time David Mara would have lived there. There is a castle also. The House Books, Field Books, and Tenure Books indicate possible house numbers which may correspond to ordnance surveys. The type of house David Mara lived in was quite old at the time, with a rating of 3C+ indicating a thatched roof house older than 25 years. It is unlikely these houses are still standing today.

Other David Mara in vicinity

David Mara/Meara – at Killacloyne, Carrigtohill:

For reference only – unknown Mara relative:

There is a David Mara at Carrigtohill area, which is about 20 kms south from Rathcormack. I'm unsure which relation this would be to the Rathcormack and area Mara families. I'm including it here (and the next several pages in depth) in case it proves to be a relative. It is the only other "David Mara" in County Cork at that time frame.

When I first found the following records, I presumed perhaps our David Mara's first wife had died and then he remarried another Honora. While this is a possible scenario, I do believe our David Mara is the one listed on the 1847 Kilcor North House Books as shown on previous pages.

I include the following for reference only (17 pages), but I do not believe it is the same David Mara that lived in Kilcor North.




Figure 29: Close-up of the handwritten page showing David Mara in Killacloyne on 24 Jan 1848, listing a house and a house return. Notice neighbouring house is Mary (Mara) Meara (with house and office):




Figure 31: Header page for Killacloyne





Figure 33: The full handwritten page of the Field Book showing David Mara in Killacloyne on 23 Apr 1851. Notice neighbouring house is Mary Mara (with house and garden):

Honoria "Norry" (Shanahan) Mara – wife of David Mara of Carrigtohill:

Looking at David's wife, Honora (also referred to as Norra) she is listed in 1853 at the house on Lot 4 in Killacloyne, part of the Parish of Carrigtohill (Carrigtwohill). This matches the reference given in the House Books in 1847-1851 (shown on previous few pages). She is listed as Honoria Mara on the following Griffith's Valuation page, listed just above a Mary Mara. To note, the same persons of Mary Mara listed above David Norra Mara are shown on the 1847 House Books at the same Lot 4. 
